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

WSNA 2025 Annual Conference Recap "The Magic of School Nutrition"

Annual Conference to learn, connect, and celebrate. This year's theme, "The Magic of School Nutrition," was very appropriate. Between staffing shortages, supply chain issues, rules and regulations, plus the reality of feeding hundreds of thousands students a day, school meal programs ARE magic.

The conference kicked off with a first-of-its-kind session focused on K-12 school funding in Washington, led by JoLynn Berge, Deputy Superintendent and Chief Financial Officer of the Northshore School District. Berge reviewed the state's funding sources for public education, explained district service expectations, and traced how school budgets have evolved in recent years. Although nutrition programs are usually independent of this funding when operating in the black, it's important to keep in mind the importance of budget management.

She reiterated that being good stewards of public dollars is everyone's responsibility. Partners from OSPI presented on how to strengthen and build engagement in your meal program. There really was a session for everyone!

Magic continued during the food show, where vendors got into the theme. The food show is always a conference highlight, a chance to connect with partners who we usually only talk with through email, try new products, and brainstorm new recipes.

NSLW 2025: A Global Taste in School Lunches

National School Lunch Week (NSLW) 2025 will be celebrated nationwide from October 13–17, under the theme: "Taste the World: Your School Lunch Passport!" This annual celebration, established in 1962 by President John F. Kennedy, shines a spotlight on the critical role school lunches play in supporting children's health, well-being, and academic success.

The purpose of NSLW is to celebrate the importance of nutritious school meals and to promote participation in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). According to the Food Research & Action Center (FRAC):

"Research shows that school meals are the most nutritious meals that American children receive. Children who consume school meals have higher intakes of milk, fruits, and vegetables, and lower intakes of snacks and desserts, compared to non-participants."

This week offers districts an opportunity to creatively showcase how school meals are not only healthy, but also diverse, delicious, and deeply connected to the community.



Wapato School District: New Flavors Coming to the Cafeteria

The Wapato School District is rolling out several exciting new menu items in celebration of National School Lunch Week. Students can look forward to scratch-made chicken fajita tacos, Domino's pizza served right in the cafeteria, and a special treat, breakfast for lunch.

Although the new offerings don't tie directly to this year's theme, they highlight the district's dedication to providing students with meals that are both fun and flavorful. By introducing fresh recipes and student favorites, Wapato continues to emphasize variety, cultural awareness, and active student engagement in school nutrition programs.

During their visit, they held a listening session with staff and community partners to discuss the impacts of federal SNAP cuts on families, underscoring the critical role Summer Meals play in supporting children and communities across Washington. Not currently binge watching anything but excited for the new season of Dancing with the Stars to start! I am always reading on my Kindle during sports practices.



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
